

Over the past several months the **Wilmington Island Garden Club** has been involved in our community in the following ways:

Continuing sponsorship of the Children's Garden at May Howard Elementary School. The speaker at our October meeting was Mary Beth Hannon, coordinator of the Children's Garden. She gave us an overview of the Children's Garden Program that we help sponsor through our donations in the Spring and Fall. The children have planted raised beds and have harvested various fruits and vegetables, even growing enough peanuts to share with the whole school. It was wonderful to hear about all of the things the children are learning. In addition to their planting and harvesting, they are learning the role bees play in the garden and even have an observation bee hive.

Making crafts: At our November Meeting entitled, "Birdhouses, Pine Cones and Oyster Shells" several garden club members taught us to decorate birdhouses with peanut butter and birdseed, how to make Christmas Trees from pine cones, jewelry/ring holders from oyster shells, wreaths and many other craft items which we sold at our December special event.








Camellia and Azalea Garden

In early November we attended a fund raiser in Plains, GA for the Rosalynn Carter Butterfly Trail. At this event, we were able to purchase two Rosalynn Carter native azaleas, which we have donated to the garden, and planted in the area behind the Compassionate Friends memorial. These azaleas were discovered in southwest GA by native azalea expert Ernest Koone and named by him in honor of the former first lady. They are not commercially available and are in limited supply, so we were very lucky to be able to obtain them for the garden. Though they are small and unimpressive at the moment, they can grow 6 - 10 feet tall, bearing clusters of yellow flowers, which appear in early spring, before the leaves. The plant is deciduous and appears as bare sticks with buds in the winter, unlike the evergreen indica azaleas in the main gardens. Both our plants have buds and we are very excited anticipating their bloom next spring.

Top 10 Gardening Tips

- 1. Place your garden in a part of your yard where you will see it regularly.
- 2. Pay attention to how sunlight plays through your garden.
- 3. One of the best gardening tips you will ever get is to plan your new garden near a water source.
- 4. When starting a garden, one of the top pieces of advice is to invest in soil that is nutrient-rich and well drained.
- 5. When space is at a premium, look to containers.
- 6. It is important to select plants that match your gardening conditions.
- 7. Knowing your "hardiness zone" can help you choose the best plants.
- 8. Planting to early (or late) in the season can spell disaster for your garden.
- 9. Apply a layer of mulch 2 to 3 inches deep around each plant
- 10. Feed plants regularly, with regular boosts of high quality nutrition for your plants.
